TerraCorps is an AmeriCorps affiliated start-up environmental non-profit preparing and mobilizing emerging leaders to help communities gain access to and conserve land for people and nature. Working at the intersection of the land conservation and urban agriculture movements, our vision is to create a future where land is the foundation of health and well-being for ALL people in EVERY community.

This year's TerraCorps program will support up to 60 full-time AmeriCorps Members across Massachusetts and Rhode Island each serving in one of five positions: Land Stewardship Coordinator (LSC), Land Conservation Coordinator (LCC), Community Engagement Coordinator (CEC), Youth Education Coordinator (YEC), or Sustainable Agriculture Coordinator (SAC). Members will serve in full-time, 11-month terms (August 29th, 2022-July 28, 2023) in which they complete at least 1,700 hours of service with one of our partner organizations. Members receive a living allowance, education award, and additional AmeriCorps benefits (see full list at end of announcement).

Growing Places (GP) is a nonprofit serving North Central Massachusetts (NCMA) since 2001 that seeks to improve the health of our region through an equitable, just local food system and sustainable environment. Our volunteer-driven organization is rooted in our history of providing backyard vegetable gardens to empower residents to supply their own healthy food and improve their well-being, but we have expanded in response to community need. Today, we work to create long-term, sustainable changes in our community – changes focused on increasing fresh food access and environmental sustainability through programs such as our community gardens, mobile market, farmers markets, home-delivered produce program, HEAL Winchendon food system rebuilding initiative, regional Local Food Works coalition, and outreach for Greening the Gateway Cities tree canopy program.

Our tight-knit and highly collaborative team consists of 4 full-time and 4 part-time staff, working in a flexible, hybrid in-office/in-field/remote format as the needs of our programs and operations dictate. We are located at the scenic Doyle Community Park and Center, which features accessible walking trails and a staff garden available to interested service Members during their service year. We are conveniently located a commutable distance from MA's second-largest city of Worcester, as well as more rural housing options in Leominster and nearby Fitchburg. As an organization, we take pride in

developing deep, transparent, and impactful relationships with our critical volunteers and community partners to further our mission and prioritize the needs our region communicates to us.

Youth Education Coordinators (YEC) build the long-term capacity of their Service Site by engaging youth in service learning, experiential education, and inquiry-based science and nature learning projects. They collaborate with schools, libraries, and youth groups on projects that connect young people to the natural world, improve science literacy, and encourage healthy lifestyles. By serving with youth in an outdoor learning environment, they reinforce the connection between people, nature, and community and foster an inclusive land stewardship ethic in future generations.

TerraCorps Members engage with their supervisors to develop and carry out three or more capacity building projects over the course of the service year. Some of these projects will involve recruiting, training, and/or managing community volunteers. **Growing Places has proposed the following potential project(s) for their Youth Education Coordinator:**

1. Growing Places would like to build the capacity of our existing youth programs and services with a focus on integrating school age youth into the local food system. Our project addresses the community need for positive opportunities for youth that promote health/wellbeing and the high rates of food insecurity in North Central MA's most underserved food desert areas.

The Youth Education Coordinator will serve with community partners that provide services to youth in North Central MA (schools, after-school and summer programs) to increase their awareness about opportunities for youth to participate in the community food system. The Member will also develop and provide education and enrichment activities for underserved youth that promote protective factors, healthy behaviors, and a connection to their community and environment. Examples include but are not limited to participation in community and school gardens, packing home delivered CSA's, cooking demonstrations/classes, aeroponic tower garden growing, prepping Fresh Chef Meal Kits, and assisting at mobile and farmers markets.

Development of these and other projects will occur during the first two months of service and consider the Member's interests and skills.

Required AmeriCorps Qualifications

- A US citizen, US national, or Lawful Permanent Resident Alien of the U.S.
- At least 18 years old
- A minimum of a high school diploma or GED
- No more than three previous terms as an AmeriCorps Member
- Pass a criminal history background check, including an FBI check

Desired Qualifications

- Strong writing and verbal communication skills
- Able to serve both independently and as a member of a team
- Comfort navigating computer software programs (Microsoft Office, including Outlook, Word, and Excel basics);
- Training and experience pertinent to the Youth Education Coordinator position and projects listed above
- Experience training and educating community members and volunteers

- Experience with curriculum development and lesson planning
- Understanding of natural systems: gardening, farming, healthy ecosystems
- Experience with experiential education, service learning, and inquiry-based learning methods

AmeriCorps Member Eligibility Requirements

All Members are expected to serve full-time, commit to serve for the entire 11-month term, and complete at least 1,700 hours of service, including time spent in trainings and several service days with the full TerraCorps cohort. Weekly service averages 38 hours and commonly includes some night and/or weekend activities.

AmeriCorps programs provide equal opportunities. TerraCorps will recruit and select persons in all positions to ensure a diverse and inclusive climate without regard to race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, age, veteran status, color, political affiliation, creed, national origin, marital status, or any other status as protected by federal, state, and local laws. We encourage applications from individuals with disabilities and will provide reasonable accommodations for interviews and service upon request.

Member Compensation and Benefits

- TerraCorps Members will receive a living allowance of up to \$18,500 (pre-tax) over the 11-month term of service, which is \$740 (pre-tax) per 25 biweekly pay periods.
- TerraCorps assists Members in obtaining health insurance coverage. Reimbursement of costs may be available.
- Childcare assistance may be provided in cases of financial need.
- Upon successful completion of a term of service, AmeriCorps Members receive a taxable \$6,495 education award that can be used for future education or to pay off existing school loans. See <https://americorps.gov/members-volunteers/segal-americorps-education-award> for info and restrictions.
- TerraCorps Members are eligible for forbearance of most federally-guaranteed student loans, as well as payment of interest accrued during service.
- TerraCorps Members will receive mentorship, training, and career development opportunities while serving directly with community-based nonprofits.
- TerraCorps Members experience the personal rewards of national service and community engagement.

Note: TerraCorps Members are responsible for their own housing and must have access to reliable transportation.

The program aims to fill all positions by mid-July, but Service Sites will continue interviews as needed until all positions are filled.
